I hope those that attended the Mock Protest Committee Hearing training session

found it worthwhile. The Racing Rules of Sailing are established first and foremost for safety, and therefore should be understood, respected, and obeyed. However in sailing, as in nearly all other sports, fouls and penalties are sometimes a part of the game; and participants should not be intimidated by the rules, fouls, or the penalties.

In nearly thirty years of racing, I've never been in a protest committee meeting; so I too, definitely learned quite a bit during the session. I want to again thank local US Sailing Judge Nancy Zangerle, and Edgewater YC Fleet Captain Mike Dills for their support and instruction.

One thing I think worth mentioning; it was noted during the session that there are only two instances when hailing your competitors is required by the rules: (1) When protesting another boat, and (2) when needing room to tack at an obstruction. However, mention was also made of the "courtesy hail". In the case presented, while not required, the right-of-way boat hailed "starboard" to advise the port-tack boat to stay clear. An appropriate response in this instance from the port-tack boat would have been "hold your course"; thereby acknowledging that the "starboard" hail had been heard and that the port-tack boat intended to give right-of-way by immediately tacking away or ducking behind. It is ultimately the responsibility of the participants to know the rights and position of the race competitors. However, courtesy hails such as these can often be a good way to help ensure safe and fun competition.

The next planned GRSC training session will be on Basic Starting Techniques and Strategies, and will be conducted by Grant Edwards. This classroom session is slated for Saturday, May 21st at the Harbor 220 clubhouse. A separate on-the-water practice session will additionally be scheduled.

For those of you that missed the Cleveland Sailing Association (CSA) breakfast last month, there were several excellent presentations and speakers. Cruisers and racers alike would have enjoyed the round-the-world travelogue; and Ces Duer presented the Cold Water Boot Camp instructional safety video, which was locally produced by the National Water Safety Congress. This video is a must see for anyone that sails in cold water; and that is definitely all of us Lake Erie sailors - especially this time of year and after this Spring.
